GOMOC CELEBRATES 40 YEARS!

It is hard to believe that the Ministry of Concern is celebrating its 40th year. It has been through many changes in its 40 years and still strives to accomplish its original goal, to help those in need, who have no where else to go.

In the beginning we were helping migrant farm workers and their families when mechanization reduced the need for hand labor. These families were no longer a part of the migrant stream and settled into our area. They were often discriminated against when trying to find housing and employment; thus sometimes going without food, prescriptions, and personal care items. The Genesee-Orleans Ministry of Concern was there to assist these migrant families, as well as, other economically poor in Genesee and Orleans Counties.

Today, 40 years later, we are still helping the economically poor in Genesee and Orleans Counties. We assist in the areas

of food, emergency shelter, utilities, prescriptions, basic furniture, and personal care items. We also assist clients in becoming independent and self-sufficient through our Follow-up Program. In the Follow-up Program the Advocate empowers clients by providing them with assistance, skills, and the understanding needed to recognize their abilities and set goals that allow them to take charge of their own lives and move towards self-sufficiency.

At the Genesee-Orleans Ministry of Concern, we also match “at risk” youth with adult mentors through our Just Friends Program and distribute gently used furniture through our Furniture Program. The Ministry of Concern will pick up basic furniture from a donors home and deliver it to a family in need. Basic furniture consists of couches, beds, kitchen tables and chairs, electric stoves, washers, dryers and refrigerators.

In 2007 we helped 3821 people. All of this is accomplished by your generosity. 44% of our funding comes from grants, 15% comes from government funding, and 41% comes from individuals, small groups and churches. Thank you for your continued support.

... WITH A LITTLE HELP

T and her husband S came to the Genesee-Orleans Ministry of Concern office in November 2007. They told the GOMOC advocate that S had been severely injured at work the week before. S was a truck driver and suffered a fall off the back of his truck that resulted in an injury to his neck. He had an appointment to meet with a specialist in a couple of weeks to see what could be done. In the meantime, S had to wear a cervical collar and stay as still as possible as to prevent any further injury. T and S said that they were waiting for S's employer to file his workers compensation paperwork. Until the paperwork was filed, S's prescriptions would not be covered and the family would have no income, as T was not working at the time.

The GOMOC advocate was able to provide assistance with S's prescriptions. Since the Christmas holiday was approaching and T and S would not be able to provide gifts for their five children, the GOMOC advocate was also able to have the family "adopted" by a local church.

T later contacted the GOMOC advocate and told her that the workers compensation paperwork had been filed and that S would soon be receiving compensation for his lost wages. T said that despite the fact that S was still facing a long recovery, the family was able to enjoy Christmas due to the assistance that they received.

This is just one example of how one's life can change in an instant. Things that were once taken for granted can become unobtainable. The GOMOC strives to make a difference in the lives of those who face such obstacles.

Now that the holidays are over we would like to share a story with you. Three weeks before Christmas, a gentleman came to our office to speak with us about what the Ministry of Concern offers. Jori sat down with him and explained all of the programs that we have. He stated he and his family would like to help out a family or two for the holiday season. We explained to him the different ways as to how he could help, such as purchasing gifts for a specific family, making a gift card donation or a monetary

donation in which we could shop for a family. He said Thank you and left. About an hour later he returned to our office with four \$100.00 gift cards to a local store here in Albion. We were shocked. He asked not to be recognized with a thank you or his name in our newsletter. It is because of the kindness of this man and his family we were able to help three families for Christmas, with gifts for the children and a festive dinner. We wish to thank Mr. Anonymous and his family for their wonderful kindness during the holiday season.



GOMOC ADVOCATE HELPS WITH UNUSUAL UTILITY SITUATION

A disabled woman was referred to us by a minister from a local church. She was in need of financial assistance with two utility bills, but was running into road blocks because the utility bills were in her deceased mother's name and she could not find an agency to help her because they were not in her name. This woman had applied for Social Security Disability and was waiting for a decision, as to whether or not, she would qualify for benefits. As a result, she was falling behind on her bills and was in danger of being without water and heat during the very cold winter months. Unfortunately, the utility companies required a fee to have services transferred into another name. This woman chose to continue to pay the bills in her mother's name, as she was on a limited income, and did not have the means to pay both the bill and the fees required to have the service changed into her name. She reached a

point when she could no longer pay her utility bills and reached out to local agencies for assistance. She called several agencies, only to be turned away, as they require the bills to be in her name. Not knowing where else to turn, she called a local church and was referred to the Genesee-Orleans Ministry of Concern. She explained her situation to me. I took down her phone number and told her I would make some phone calls on her behalf. My first phone call involved calling the local utility company, which carried both of her services. I explained the woman's situation to

the person on the phone. The representative from the utility company explained to me that if the client came down and filled out an application, she would waive the fee on the one utility and transfer the service into her name. She also said that the client could transfer the other service into her name and pay the fee on that account when she was able. The Genesee-Orleans Ministry of Concern was then able to assist her with one of her utility bills. I then referred the client to another service agency for the other utility bill. It was due to the collaboration of several professional disciplines, which included churches and several agencies, which ensured that services were delivered to this client and her needs were met.
